Letter From Board President Jim Burke

Ah, at long last, spring is in the air in northern California. The planet comes back to life, as does Billyland. Not that we've been asleep, mind you, it's just been a while since we've all gotten together. As the weather gets warmer, and the sun stronger, that situation is about to change.

Through the winter months, your friendly Billy Board and Billy Office have remained busy, grappling with our finances, putting together our annual budget, and planning our May Day gathering, among other things. So, without further ado, let me tell you some of the things that are currently going on in our Billy Club and Foundation.

First of all, I'm very pleased to announce that Jim Gilson has recently joined the Billy Board. Jim is a longtime Billy with a lengthy résumé of involvement in the organization in many capacities. He's a wonderful mix of heart and reason, and his influence on the board and the organization is already being felt in many good ways.

I also want to take a minute to thank every one who has sent us a check for our annual fundraiser. Our fundraiser has been a huge success this year, and has gone a long way in easing pressure on our general fund. The general fund finances practically everything that goes on in the organization, with the exception of moneys distributed by the Richard Locke Scholarship Fund and the Billy Emergency Support Fund. Thus far, we have raised around \$9,500. As I promised in my fundraiser letter, everyone who donates will receive

our personal thanks, and will have his or her name listed in our honor roll here in the *Billy Times*.

On to other news. As many of you have now heard, for the first time this coming year our New Year's gathering will not be held at the Heartwood Institute. The new owners of Heartwood have decided to use their winter break from now on for community building among their students and staff. While this is sad news for us, their desire for building community is very understandable. Admittedly, it's hard to walk away from this long tradition of Billy gatherings at Heartwood, and the magic of the place—the temple, the snack and snuggle shack, the incredible warmth of the Heartwood staff—is unforgettable for those of us who have experienced it. Heartwood was my first Billy gathering (1998-99), and I know I'll miss it terribly. But all is not bleak. The new Heartwood owners are currently in the process of acquiring some property near the Institute that they plan to offer to groups like ourselves, starting sometime in 2008. It apparently has many of the same amenities offered by the original Heartwood site, as well as some new ones, such as a spa and a restaurant. I frankly don't know if this new site will work for us or not, but once the new place is available for viewing—sometime next spring, we hope—interested board members and other Billys will plan a visit there. In the interim, the board is considering other locations for this coming New Year's gathering, with the hope of finding a place that provides some of that unique Heartwood energy and spirit at an affordable price for most Billys. We'll keep you posted on any new developments.

As I write this article, registration is wrapping up for our May Day gathering, "The Queer Sporting

Scholarships: Problems and Solutions

Dear Billys,

I'm writing this letter to you as a longtime Billy, having attended gatherings steadily since the second one in 1988, and as someone who holds this community in the highest regard. I've often said, having visited and communicated with communities around the United States, that I believe ours is the best there is for gay men anywhere. I'm not writing in my capacity as a member of the Billy Foundation Board; that's only a small part of my Billy identity, though I am informed by having been on the board for the past several years.

I want the community to know what has been happening with scholarships for our gatherings. First I want to provide some history. Then I'll tell you about a couple of wonderful opportunities that lie before us.

For our earliest gatherings, we suggested a \$5 donation per night, but that meant everything from carting in kitchen equipment to digging latrines. As to the latter, I remember the major upgrade we made after a couple of years when we hung cloth to blow in the wind between the holes. When we started renting Saratoga Springs, we had to begin to charge. I think it was \$15 per night in the beginning, and Ron Vanscoyk wondered if guys would be willing to pay that much. And along with heart circle and other traditions we borrowed from Radical Faeries, we brought the tradition of NOTAFLOF—No One Turned Away for Lack of Funds. It was an idea based on the value of creating a classless society, one where belonging would not be based on financial resources, but rather on the longing to be with brothers of heart. We were able to adhere to that policy for many years.

Then, a Billy Board, faced with a gathering where they lacked the funds for scholarships, felt forced to make a decision to turn away from a gathering some people who had requested scholarships. Once the word got out, many in the community were upset. People called a town hall meeting at the gathering and concerned Billys crowded into Cabin 1, back when it had a big living room, and

spilled over onto the porch. I remember standing for hours in a sweaty-hot July room that was filled with passion. And the message delivered by the circle was: Something as values-based as our scholarship policy is not to be set by a board in isolation; the community needs to be informed and to have the opportunity to help solve these kinds of problems.

Out of that meeting, we chose to frame our value as: "NOTAFLOF is not a policy but it is a strong goal." We couldn't guarantee that we'd always have the funds to provide for everyone, but we would work toward that end. Later, when former porn star and hot'n'healthy sexhero Richard Locke, AKA Butterfly, died, he left a bequest to start a scholarship fund that has ever after been known as the Richard Locke Scholarship Fund. A few years ago, we had the luxury of a \$6,000 Irvine Foundation grant which we used to fund scholarships for the year, and otherwise we've relied on donors as well as on dipping into the General Fund.

We have had challenges meeting that goal over the years. But when more scholarships were requested than the Foundation had funds for, we went to the community and donations increased. Again and again, the lesson has been given—go to the community and we, the community, will respond. And so I come to you.

The board has had to make some hard decisions lately regarding scholarships. There have been significantly more requests than RLSF funds available. This has been an increasing problem and was especially true of May Day this year, with the result that some Billys weren't at the gathering because of this shortage. I know, too, that there are Billys who cannot afford our gatherings and feel uncomfortable asking for support in participating, and I want to assure them that we want them with us.

I hope that you, the community, will join together in looking into this issue. As I see it, there are three questions we should explore:

1. Do NOTAFLOF and the diversity it allows continue to be community values?
2. What policy is best applied in distributing available funds?
3. Can we raise enough money, through events, grants, and donors, to meet the needs of those in

Volunteering at the San Francisco Pride Parade

Each year SF Pride, the nonprofit organization that runs the Pride Parade, takes half the money earned in donations and puts it in a fund. It then gives that money in the form of grants to community organizations that help out with the Parade. Money is divided in proportion to the number of volunteer hours each organization contributes to the Parade. Last year the Billy Club took part, and we earned just over \$2100 for the scholarship fund. We're doing it again this year.

There are three ways you can volunteer with the Billys on Pride Weekend (Saturday and Sunday, June 23 and 24). Each hour of volunteer time will count the same toward the Billy Club's slice of the pie, however you help.

1) The Billy Club is putting together a team of at least 10 volunteers to cover a four- to five-hour shift collecting donations at the entrances

to the celebration area around Civic Center. The shift will be sometime during Pride Weekend, but the exact time hasn't been settled yet. If you'd like to help, please contact John Cwiakala at johncwiakala@sbcglobal.net or (415) 436-9723.

2) Each year I work behind the scenes managing the home base (still known as "the Tent," even though it's been indoors for a few years now) for over 150 volunteer safety monitors. We check them in, give them a place to stash their sweatshirts and backpacks while they're on duty, provide them with breakfast and coffee, and get them what they need to do their job. Shifts are two hours long at various peak check-in and check-out times on Saturday and Sunday; our greatest need is for 7:30 to 9:30 on Sunday morning as we prepare frantically for the Parade itself. If you're up for it, you can work more than one shift, or help me on Sunday morning and then work as a safety monitor during the Parade. (That's Number Three, coming up next.) Just Like Vegas: Confidentiality in Our Community

Many of us have seen the clever TV ads—a scene of an illicit affair or some other sneaky event that would be disastrous for someone if it came out in public. The ads end with a voice proclaiming, “Whatever happens in Vegas, stays in Vegas.”

The words often said at the beginnings of heart circles are a bit different, with fewer syllables: “Whatever’s said here, stays here.” Alas, gossip and dish are part of our DNA. How do we reconcile that with the need to make heart circle a safe space for us to share from deep within ourselves? And why?

Confidential: “spoken, written, acted on, etc., in strict privacy or secrecy; secret: a confidential remark” (from dictionary.com). In Billy community I’ll say pretty much anything to anybody: I don’t really care if or how it’s passed on to anyone else. I don’t need anything about me to be a secret. I figure it’s pretty much random who shows up in any particular heart circle.

But that’s just me. I know another Billy who gets really torqued if he hears about anything he’s said in circle from anyone who wasn’t there. Perhaps there are things he’s not comfortable sharing at all, or he feels that it’s his decision who knows what about him. I don’t need to convince him that my way is better (of course it is!), or know why he feels the way he does, I just need to respect it. This is just to say that we each have come to our own way of communicating about our lives, as a result of our value systems and our life experiences up to this point.

What if confidentiality is violated? How might any particular Billy react? A Billy might experience or witness a breach of confidentiality, or be told about one, and may begin self-censoring his shares in fear that some of his painfully expressed emotions might be repeated without any context and without his body language and tone of voice to give it texture. Our community will be denied an opportunity to truly know this Billy more intimately.

Another Billy might react by avoiding heart circles altogether, or it might even scare this person from returning to gatherings. For some Billys, the heart circle may be their main or even only support for processing or healing a traumatic event.

What can we do? Certainly we can emphasize and expand the confidentiality piece of the heart circle opening ritual and its importance to the health of our community. Think about interrupting when someone begins talking about another Billy’s intimate life, and suggest that it may not be appropriate to talk about this if that Billy’s information came from a heart circle share. We are a creative and imaginative tribe and we can think of many other ways to preserve confidentiality.

If we lose confidentiality, we lose the glue that makes us the intimate community that we are. ♡

3) Being a safety monitor is easily the most fun you can have as a Parade volunteer, but it’s also the greatest commitment, and in some years it’s also the most exhausting. (Ask me sometime about the year Fred Phelps showed up. Maybe you’d better not.) Safety monitors work right on the parade route, keeping things flowing smoothly and safely. Nobody gets to see the Parade closer up than the safety monitors! You’ll show up at the Tent (see above) at 8:30 on Sunday morning and work until the parade ends, which is usually about 2:30. Breakfast, lunch, snacks, sunscreen, and cold bottled water are provided. Shorter shifts are also available at other times, because we also wander through the celebration area watching for potential hazards, helping emergency vehicles get through the crowd, and generally helping people stay safer. If you want to pick up a few hot phone numbers at the same time, go for it; being a safety monitor is a license to flirt and a ready excuse to

cannot afford them. In addition, the Emergency Support Fund and the General Fund are not funded to levels that can assure the continued community support and community building activities we all seek for the Billys. So, what to do?? I’m looking for ideas, suggestions, brainstorm, and HELP!!

If you know about grants, let’s talk! If you know about setting up monthly donations, let’s talk! If you have ideas on how to create scholarships, let’s talk! If you’d like to endow the Billys with a monetary gift, let’s talk! If you know about how to set up and manage an Endowment Fund, let’s talk! If you have a really big endowment . . . to hell with talking!! But I digress . . . :-)

Thanks in advance for your ideas and support on how we can assure the financial security of the Billys into the future, and have fun building and playing within our community in the meantime.

strike up conversations with strangers.

Just to clear up a frequent source of confusion: We are *not* Security. Security protects *stuff*. We protect *people*.

First-time safety monitors must take a two-hour training class beforehand. Classes are held at varied times and places in the last two weeks before Pride Weekend; a Friday night class right before Pride Weekend is convenient for those in town just for the weekend. You’ll learn how to spot and deal with common safety hazards, how to work *with* a crowd and not *against* them, what we can do in emergencies to help out our medical volunteers, how to smooth tense situations, and many other topics. Safety monitors work in teams led by experienced monitors. Join us and you’ll meet a community of volunteers who come back year after year, and who get together to work at other Bay Area events as well. our community who truly need help in order to attend our gatherings?

The board ultimately needs to answer the second question, but I feel community input should help guide the board in setting that policy. There is a committee formed of board and community members that is tasked with creating an interim policy. If this issue resonates with you, we will be asking you to participate in refining the policy after it's been tried for a few gatherings.

It's up to the overall community to answer questions 1 and 3. If we truly hold as our value the goal of NOTAFLOF, then I believe we need to answer the fundraising question affirmatively as well.

There are two very exciting opportunities available to us that I want to let you know about. The first is a matching grant from an "angel" that continues to be in effect through 2007. All donations to RLSF will be doubled thanks to this generous member of the Billy community.

Also, another significant opportunity is available for us to raise funds to meet the need. Last year a few Billys, organized by Scott Marley, volunteered at the SF Pride Parade, and they raised \$2100 for the RLSF. This year, we can do even more. (See page three for details.) I hope we don't take flag carriers away from the Food for Thought AIDS Food Bank effort, but I hope Billys will enthusiastically embrace this chance to donate a few hours toward keeping our gatherings financially accessible. With enough volunteers, we will be able to raise a significant amount of money for the Richard Locke Scholarship Fund.

I hope, too, that we continue to care passionately about the values that make our community the best in the world.

Not exactly a celebration of "jockdom," but more of a way for those of us who were chosen last for the baseball team when we were young to laugh, play, and celebrate games and sports on our own terms for once. The whole idea has inspired a rich discussion on Billenet and personally among many Billys I know. It's my hope that this gathering is great fun, and for some a truly healing experience. Finally, being picked last for a team will be a source of pride instead of shame!

Our July gathering this year also promises to be "juicy" in its own unique way. A primary theme of this gathering will be to reach out to those Billys who, for whatever reason, have left our community. In addition to all the high summer fun and frivolity that typically happens at this gathering, there will be a serious event—a healing circle/ritual, which will be focused on sending healing energy to those in the Billy community who were wounded during the so-called "troubles" of two years ago. Our new Board member Jim Gilson is heading up this activity, which is designed to help close wounds, not reopen them, in a very unique Billy way. Although the July gathering is normally closed to Billykin, any Billy sisters of ours (and Billys who hadn't planned on attending the gathering but want to attend the ritual) are invited to join us in this healing ritual without having to pay any gathering registration fee to do so.

Finally, I'd like to really speak (or write) from the heart. The board just wrapped up its annual retreat, held this year in Bodega Bay. I wish I could say it's two days of nonstop fun, but actually it's closer to two days of nonstop work, punctuated by an occasional walk on the beach to decompress. It's a time for us to bond as board members and as Billys, as well as to focus on issues we don't have time to deal with in our crowded monthly board meetings. It was an emotional roller coaster ride at times, but on the whole a productive weekend. One issue we focused on at length was the role of volunteering in the organization, particularly the ongoing challenge of getting sufficient volunteer support to organize the five to six gatherings we currently hold each year.

We on the board are extremely grateful for all of the

volunteer work Billys do for us, especially around the gatherings. Without it, there frankly would be no gatherings. But there is a problem—there are just not enough people stepping forward for us to sustain five to six gatherings per year. This is not an effort on my part to shame or guilt-trip folks into stepping forward. Far from it. It may be that we should consider holding fewer gatherings in 2008 or 2009—maybe three or four instead of our current level. I'm merely thinking out loud at this point. This is *your* organization, not the board's, and it's ultimately the decision of the membership whether we head in this direction or not. Until we make such a change—if we ever do—I urge you to search your heart and ask yourself whether you'd be interested in playing a major role in putting on one of our gatherings, either on the coordinator or subcoordinator level. I've done both, and I can honestly say that while there's certainly work involved, it can also be a great deal of fun, and a major opportunity to bond with your fellow Billys as you help fashion the unique flavor, energy, and spirit of a Billy gathering. I hope those of you who have never taken this path will give it some thought. If you decide to step forward, we on the Board stand ready to help and support you in any way we can.

As the warmth of spring unfolds, the Billy Club comes out of its winter slumber. Our gathering season begins, with all of its excitement, intensity, silliness, and wonder. I hope you'll play a part in this adventure, yet to be created. ☺
